Gospel Reading

Luke 8:26-39 (from *The Message*) (N.T. pg. 63)

²⁶⁻²⁹ They sailed on to the country of the Gerasenes, directly opposite Galilee. As he stepped out onto land, a madman from town met him; he was a victim of demons. He hadn't worn clothes for a long time, nor lived at home; he lived in the cemetery. When he saw Jesus he screamed, fell before him, and bellowed, "What business do you have messing with me? You're Jesus, Son of the High God, but don't give me a hard time!" (The man said this because Jesus had started to order the unclean spirit out of him.) Time after time the demon threw the man into convulsions. He had been placed under constant guard and tied with chains and shackles, but crazed and driven wild by the demon, he would shatter the bonds.

30-31 Jesus asked him, "What is your name?"

"Mob. My name is Mob," he said, because many demons afflicted him. And they begged Jesus desperately not to order them to the bottomless pit.

32-33 A large herd of pigs was browsing and rooting on a nearby hill. The demons begged Jesus to order them into the pigs. He gave the order. It was even worse for the pigs than for the man. Crazed, they stampeded over a cliff into the lake and drowned.

Those tending the pigs, scared to death, bolted and told their story in town and country. People went out to see what had happened. They came to Jesus and found the man from whom the demons had been sent, sitting there at Jesus' feet, wearing decent clothes and making sense. It was a holy moment, and for a short time they were more reverent than curious. Then those who had seen it happen told how the demoniac had been saved.

37-39 Later, a great many people from the Gerasene

countryside got together and asked Jesus to leave—too much change, too fast, and they were scared. So Jesus got back in the boat and set off. The man whom he had delivered from the demons asked to go with him, but he sent him back, saying, "Go home and tell everything God did in you." So he went back and preached all over town everything Jesus had done in him.

About Today's Worship

We are developing a more blended style of worship with new contemporary worship songs and music as well as our traditional hymns and pieces. All of our hymns are from the new Presbyterian hymnal *Glory to God* printed for you in the bulletin. The choir sings. We have organ music. The bell choir rings. We hear our students. We hear soloists. We hear the band. It's a mix, and we don't have everything in the same day—unless you want to skip lunch. We hope it touches you.

About Summer Worship

We move into our historic Webb Chapel in the summer for a more intimate setting and the air conditioning! Webb was built in 1888 exclusively to be a Sunday school space. In those days, the Sanctuary for the Presbyterian Church was across from our cemetery on Main Street (next to the Junior School) in what is now the Masonic Temple. Every Sunday for more than 40 years in all seasons of weather, the "Presbyterian parade" would flow out of worship in the sanctuary and down Main Street to Green Avenue to Webb Chapel for Sunday School. The Parish House was built in 1929 and Webb Chapel became our worship space until the "new" Sanctuary was completed in 1953.

About Today's Readings

We print the scripture readings in the bulletin, so you can follow along more easily. We also include the page numbers if you want to read from your pew Bible. Most Sundays, our readings are from that same New Revised Standard Version translation. Today is an exception. All of our readings and scriptural references are from *The Message*, a more modern plain-English translation of the Bible.

About Psalms 42 & 43

We don't often read from the Psalms, and today's reading is unusual. No one is sure why this Psalm was broken into two because it is clearly one song. It's a lament with similar refrain-like repetitions. Maybe an ancient worship leader was getting creative with the worship order? Two services? It's anybody's guess, but the writer is thought to be an ancient Levite named Korah, who was head of an entire guild of Psalm-writers.

About Luke 8:26-39

After a long Eastertide side-trip into the Gospel of John, today we return to the Revised Common Lectionary Cycle year "C" Gospel of Luke. Today's story is one of healing and exorcism with Jesus at the center. The herd of swine receiving the "legion" or mob of demons would have been very comical to an ancient Jewish audience since pork was prohibited in their diet. Clearly if there is a market for pork in Gerasa, the territory is largely populated by Gentiles.

About the Affirmation of Faith

Most of the time we mine the depths of our Book of Confessions for affirmations of faith including the traditional Apostles' Creed. All of the confessions are based on scripture and they build on the reformed tradition as the church changes and morphs through the ages. Sometimes a reading straight out of scripture speaks in direct affirmation of our faith in Jesus Christ. Our scripture readings every week come as a part of the Revised Common Lectionary Cycle and today's affirmation comes on schedule from the

book of Galatians, one of the authentic Pauline letters. This too is from the plain English translation *The Message*.

Questions to Go

What is God nagging me to do that I am trying to ignore? Do I know my neighbors? By name?

When do I share my deepest frustrations and fears with God?

The stanzas here need to be understood as representing the voice of God, while the refrain (based on Isaiah 6:8) is the faithful human response to God's call. This becomes clearer if a leader or small group sings the stanzas, with the congregation joining on the refrain.

317 In Christ There Is No East or West



This setting expands and enhances the thematic inclusiveness of an early 20th-century text by adapting the melody of a traditional spiritual to carry these words. This 1940 pairing marked the first use of African American musical material in a mainline North American hymnal.
